



ASSESSING THE RELATIONSHIP AMONG ORGANIZATIONAL RECOGNITION, PERFORMANCE APPRAISAL SYSTEMS AND EFFECTIVE UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATION IN RIVERS STATE

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ABSTRACT

This study examined the relationship between organizational recognition, performance appraisal systems, and effective university administration in public universities in Rivers State. The study adopted a correlational research design to determine the extent to which organizational practices influence administrative effectiveness. The population comprised all vice-chancellors, academic, and non-teaching staff in the three public universities in Rivers State: Ignatius Ajuru University of Education (986), Rivers State University (1,691), and the University of Port Harcourt (2,891), totaling 5,565 respondents. Using the Taro Yamane formula, a sample size of 373 participants (3 vice-chancellors, 200 academic staff, and 170 non-teaching staff) was selected through stratified sampling. Data were collected using a structured questionnaire divided into two sections: Organizational Recognition and Performance Appraisal Questionnaire (ORPAQ) and the Effective Administration of Public Universities Questionnaire (EAPUQ), both rated on a four-point Likert scale. Instrument validity was confirmed by experts in Educational Management, while the Cronbach Alpha reliability coefficient of .750 indicated strong internal consistency. Data were analyzed using mean, standard deviation, and the Pearson Product Moment Correlation Coefficient at a 0.05 significance level. Findings revealed a significant positive relationship between organizational recognition, performance appraisal systems, and effective university administration. The study concluded that fostering fairness, transparency, and recognition in appraisal systems enhances administrative effectiveness in public universities within Rivers State.

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INTRODUCTION

Effective administration of universities depends on a combination of structural resources, governance arrangements, and human-centred human-resource practices that shape staff behaviour and institutional culture. Two interrelated HR practices organizational recognition and performance appraisal systems play a critical role in shaping employee motivation, commitment, and productivity, all of which influence administrative outcomes (Aguinis, 2009; Armstrong, 2022). Organizational recognition encompasses both intrinsic forms of acknowledgement (e.g., praise, meaningful assignments) and extrinsic rewards (e.g., awards, promotion); when perceived as fair and consistent, recognition contributes to higher job satisfaction and lower turnover intentions among academic and non-academic staff (Armstrong, 2022; Jo et al., 2025). Performance appraisal systems, as part of broader performance-management frameworks, help clarify expectations, provide developmental feedback, and link individual performance to institutional goals functions that are essential to administrative coordination and accountability in higher education (Aguinis, 2009).

In the Nigerian context, and specifically within public universities in Rivers State, universities confront pressures such as constrained funding, expanding student populations, and complex governance demands that intensify the need for effective administrative practices (Aina & Onyekwere, 2022). Evidence from studies of Nigerian higher education indicates that weaknesses in performance-management processes and inadequate recognition mechanisms frequently undermine staff morale and productivity, with knock-on effects for teaching quality, research output, and service delivery (Ojokuku, 2013). Empirical investigations in Nigerian public universities report perceptions of appraisal systems as being incomplete or unfair, for example, overemphasising research to the detriment of teaching and community service thereby reducing the legitimacy and motivational impact of appraisal outcomes (Ojokuku, 2013). Given these contextual constraints, examining how recognition and appraisal together influence administrative effectiveness is both timely and policy-relevant for Rivers State institutions.

Theoretically, the effectiveness of appraisal and recognition practices hinges on design features (clarity of criteria, linkage to development/rewards), procedural fairness, and managerial capability to implement systems reliably (Aguinis, 2009). Armstrong (2022) highlighted that recognition systems work best when they are embedded in coherent HR strategies that align reward mechanisms with career progression and capacity building; similarly, contemporary performance-management scholarship stresses that appraisal must be located within ongoing performance conversations rather than episodic, administrative exercises (Aguinis, 2009; Armstrong, 2022). Recent empirical work further suggests that the positive effects of recognition and appraisal on staff outcomes are conditional on perceptions of fairness and transparency, leadership support, and institutional capacity to translate appraisal results into meaningful rewards or development actions (Jo et al., 2025). These mechanisms provide the analytic basis for expecting that improvements in recognition and appraisal can contribute to better administrative coordination, responsiveness, and service delivery in universities.

Despite the theoretical rationale and growing international evidence, there is a relative scarcity of localized, joint assessments of organizational recognition and performance appraisal as predictors of administrative effectiveness in Rivers State's public universities. Existing Rivers State studies have examined institutional policy and autonomy (Aina & Onyekwere, 2022), but few have tested how HR practices interact to shape concrete administrative outcomes such as decision-making efficiency, staff productivity, and stakeholder responsiveness. This study

therefore seeks to fill that empirical gap by assessing the relationships among organizational recognition, performance appraisal systems, and effective university administration in Rivers State producing evidence that can inform HR reform, managerial training, and policy interventions aimed at strengthening governance and service delivery in the state's higher-education institutions.

Statement of the Problem

Effective university administration relies heavily on human resource practices that promote motivation, accountability, and organizational commitment. However, in many Nigerian public universities, including those in Rivers State, the administration continues to struggle with inefficiencies, low staff morale, and declining productivity, despite various reforms. One key factor contributing to these challenges is the weak implementation of organizational recognition and performance appraisal systems. Recognition of staff achievements is often inconsistent, politicized, or based on seniority rather than merit, which discourages excellence and innovation. Similarly, performance appraisal processes are frequently perceived as subjective, irregular, and disconnected from tangible rewards or professional development opportunities.

These deficiencies are contrary to the Nigerian National Policy on Education (FRN, 20214) and have created an environment where employees feel undervalued and disengaged, reducing their motivation to contribute effectively to administrative goals. Furthermore, administrative leaders often lack adequate training in human resource management, leading to ineffective supervision and poor feedback mechanisms. While studies have examined performance management and motivation separately, there is a paucity of empirical research that explores how recognition and appraisal systems jointly influence administrative effectiveness in the context of Rivers State's public universities. Understanding this relationship is critical because effective administration depends not only on policies and structures but also on the extent to which employees are fairly recognized and appraised. This study therefore seeks to assess how organizational recognition and performance appraisal systems interact to influence the effectiveness of university administration in Rivers State.

Aim and Objectives of the Study

The aim of this study is to assess the relationship among organizational recognition, performance appraisal systems, and effective university administration in Rivers State. Specifically, the study sought to:

- Determine the relationship between organizational recognition and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State.
- Evaluate the relationship between organizational performance appraisal and effective administration of public- universities in Rivers State.

Research Questions

The following research questions were formulated to guide the study:

- What is the relationship' between the organizational recognitions and effective administration of public Universities in Rivers State?
- What is the relationship between organizational performances appraisal and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State?

Hypotheses

The following hypotheses postulated guide the direction of the study at 0.05 levels of significance:

- There is no significant relationship between organizational recognition and effective administration of public- universities in Rivers State.
- There is no significant relationship between organizational performances appraisal and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State.

CONCEPTUALIZATION

Equity Theory of Motivation (Adams, 1965)

The Equity Theory of Motivation, developed by J. Stacy Adams in 1965, is one of the most influential frameworks for understanding fairness and justice in organizational behaviour and human resource management. The theory posits that employees are motivated by their perceptions of fairness in social exchanges with their employers. According to Adams, individuals evaluate the ratio between their inputs (such as effort, experience, education, and loyalty) and the outcomes they receive (such as pay, recognition, promotion, and benefits), and compare this ratio to that of others performing similar roles within or outside the organization (Adams, 1965). When individuals perceive equity, they experience satisfaction and are likely to maintain or even increase their level of performance. However, when they perceive inequity, either under-reward or over-reward. They experience tension, which they attempt to reduce through behavioural or cognitive adjustments (Aguinis, 2009; Armstrong, 2022).

Equity Theory is grounded in the broader concept of social exchange theory, which views the employment relationship as a reciprocal exchange process where both employer and employee expect fair treatment (Blau, 1964). In this sense, motivation is not determined solely by tangible rewards but also by perceptions of justice, respect, and acknowledgment within the workplace. Adams' theory emphasizes the psychological contract the implicit understanding between employees and employers about fairness and reciprocity. When organizations fail to meet employees' expectations of fairness in recognition and performance appraisal, employees may withdraw effort, resist administrative directives, or develop negative attitudes toward management (Adams, 1965; Colquitt et al., 2013).

A core component of Equity Theory is the comparison process. Employees compare their input–output ratios to those of relevant others colleagues, peers in similar roles, or even individuals in different organizations. For instance, an academic staff member in a public university in Rivers State may assess whether the recognition, promotion, or performance appraisal received is comparable to that of colleagues with similar qualifications and workload. If disparities exist without justification, the employee perceives inequity, which can lead to dissatisfaction and decreased administrative cooperation (Aina & Onyekwere, 2022; Ojokuku,

2013). Consequently, perceptions of fairness play a critical role in shaping staff attitudes, productivity, and institutional effectiveness.

In the context of organizational recognition and performance appraisal systems, Equity Theory provides a robust explanatory framework. Recognition programs, awards, or commendations represent organizational efforts to acknowledge employee contributions. However, when such recognition is distributed unevenly or based on non-meritocratic criteria such as favoritism or political considerations employees perceive inequity. Similarly, performance appraisal systems are designed to measure and reward employee performance objectively. Yet, when appraisal processes are inconsistent, opaque, or biased, they undermine trust in management and diminish motivation (Aguinis, 2009; Armstrong, 2022). Therefore, both recognition and appraisal are critical mechanisms through which perceptions of fairness are reinforced or eroded within the university administrative structure.

For public universities in Rivers State, where administrative efficiency and employee morale are often challenged by resource constraints, bureaucratic bottlenecks, and politicization, the Equity Theory provides an insightful lens for understanding organizational behaviour. Many university employees in Nigeria report dissatisfaction with promotion procedures, recognition practices, and performance evaluations (Ojokuku, 2013). When employees believe that their efforts are not adequately recognized or rewarded, they may engage in withdrawal behaviours such as lateness, absenteeism, or minimal compliance all of which undermine effective administration. Conversely, when recognition and appraisal systems are transparent and equitable, they foster organizational trust, enhance morale, and improve administrative performance (Armstrong, 2022; Jo et al., 2025).

The practical application of Equity Theory in university administration emphasizes the importance of procedural and distributive justice. Procedural justice refers to fairness in the processes that determine outcomes, such as how performance appraisals are conducted and who decides promotions. Distributive justice refers to fairness in the allocation of rewards and recognition. Ensuring both forms of justice helps create an environment where employees feel valued and fairly treated, promoting commitment to institutional goals (Colquitt et al., 2013). Administrators in public universities can therefore use the principles of Equity Theory to design fair recognition schemes, develop transparent performance appraisal systems, and ensure that evaluation criteria are objective and merit-based.

Moreover, Equity Theory suggests that when inequities are perceived, management must act quickly to restore balance. This may involve communicating the rationale behind decisions, revising appraisal criteria, or offering compensatory recognition to underappreciated staff. In higher education contexts, where performance is multidimensional, spanning teaching, research, and service fairness in appraisal becomes especially important. When institutional leaders align recognition and appraisal practices with Equity Theory principles, universities can improve employee motivation, cooperation, and overall administrative effectiveness (Aina & Onyekewre, 2022).

Thus, the Equity Theory of Motivation provides a powerful framework for understanding how perceptions of fairness influence employee motivation and organizational performance. Within public universities in Rivers State, it offers a theoretical basis for examining how equitable recognition and fair performance appraisal systems contribute to effective administration. Fairness and justice are not only ethical imperatives but strategic levers for enhancing staff engagement, trust, and institutional productivity. The theory therefore

underscores the need for transparent, consistent, and merit-driven HR practices as foundations for achieving administrative excellence in higher education.

Organizational Recognition and Effective Administration of Public Universities

Recognition simply refers to the action of recognizing or the state of being recognized. In the academic setting, it is the formal acknowledgement of staff or employee in the school or the way of identifying and reward staff for outstanding contributions to the universities to realize the predetermined goals and objectives.

Recognition aims at providing staff with an opportunity to recognize and learn from outstanding co-workers. For effective administration of universities factors such as accommodating salaries and allowances, security and social needs are to be fairly met. Salaries and allowance should be paid as and when due. Accommodation such as office spaces, staff common room should be provided. Staff in a particular school should be encouraged to live in harmony of love and mutual trust. The school environment should be made free from tension and antagonism. The school administrator should strive to maintain a cohesive work group where fairness and equity prevail. The staff with special or outstanding contributions or performance should not only be recognized with the word of mouth but be rewarded. The awards should be instantly made and the type of jobs given to each staff should be interesting, challenging and meaningful, in order to challenge the utilization of the individual staff's ability (Ololube et al., 2018; Ololube, 2024).

As earlier stated, the effective administration of the universities depends on the universities leaders or administrators with positive values who sees participative leadership as important by involving staff in some administrative processes like decision-making in schools. This will increase the individual's sense of responsibility thereby boosting his ego and personality. Performance standard has to be clearly stipulated by the administrator against which promotions, increase in salaries and the satisfaction of cherished needs have to be made contingent upon. Vice chancellors should allow staffs both academic and non-teaching access to their appraisals and they should be given opportunity to contribute towards them and vice chancellor should as well avoid such threats that would dampen the motivation of staff disciplinary cases such as suspension with or without pay, termination and outright dismissals should follow administrative procedures to give victims opportunity to defend themselves since every employees values job security.

For efficiency and effectiveness in the administration of universities, the schools leaders or the administrators should as well consider the social needs of the staff by making deliberate attempts to carry every staff along in school activities. Such unnecessary discriminations based on sex, age, ethnicity, tribe, and religions should be de-emphasized. Everybody should be seen as member of a larger farming staff should be encouraged to show love and acceptance to one another and esprit de-corps should be seen to manifest. Such get togetherness like welcome parties, and end of year parties and their likes should be encouraged. Udoh (2004) stated that "the best and surest way to command the respect of the inferiors is not by blustering and threatening, but by holiness and love and a constant regard to their welfare and to God's will and honor".

According to Bush (2003), recognition in universities is of paramount important in the effective administration of universities because once the staffs are recognized in the school their ego or esteem needs can be accomplished through delegation of duties to them by the

universities leaders or administrators and by so doing, the staffs ability is not only tested but his underlying skills and talents are also discovered and their participation in decision-making process in the school enable them to identify fully with the policies and decision of the school which in turn create spirit of belongings and encouraged them to work harder for the realization of school goals and objectives.

Performance Appraisal and Effective Administration of Universities

Performance appraisal is an important personnel activity designed to bring about the desired effect on the employee. It can be seen as the step by step judgment of the performance of the staff and the identification of staff strength and weakness for further growth and development. It also means the systematic process in which staff of a particular organization are evaluated and given feedback on their performance and further reward and promotion. Psychologists showed that frequency of analysis on performance is very effective in employee motivation and closer is it to the actual job performance, the more effective. One of the basic aims of performance appraisal system is to monitor staff performance, boost staff motivation that will in turn improve company morale and is a useful tool for understanding and assessing employee skill and potentials.

The effectiveness of an appraisal system in universities is determined by the performance standard set by the universities leaders or the administrators which must be in accordance with the established individual job description that is tied to organizational goals and objectives. These standards should be a written document which will make it legally binding and objective. Failure to align performance standards with organizational goals and objectives leads to misunderstandings, poor morale, and lack of job satisfaction, ineffectiveness, and confusion (Grossi, 2012). For effective administration of universities in Nigeria, it is very important that school administrator makes it as the duties that every university lecturer to receives a written performance appraisal annually which provides a feedback on performance and justifies personnel decision such as promotion and compensation continuity with the system, termination or warning (Okafor, 2018).

According to Smith (2011), the criteria for measuring the performance of the education process can be divided into three groups; teaching, research and service; teaching which the primary assignment of the academic is includes not only what is taught but also how it was taught. In appraising the staff the emphasis of the administrators should not be place more on publication and paper presentation at conferences than on effective teaching which is the beginning of academic excellence.

METHODOLOGY

This study adopted a correlational research design. The purpose of this design was to examine the nature and degree of the relationship between organizational recognition and performance appraisal systems and the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. The correlational approach was considered appropriate because it enables the researcher to determine the extent to which variations in one variable are associated with variations in another without manipulating the variables involved.

The population of the study comprised all vice-chancellors, as well as academic and non-teaching staff from the three public universities in Rivers State. These institutions include

Ignatius Ajuru University of Education (986 staff), Rivers State University (1,691 staff), and the University of Port Harcourt (2,891 staff). Thus, the total population consisted of 3 vice-chancellors and 5,565 academic and non-teaching staff drawn from the three universities.

A total of 373 respondents were selected as the sample size for the study, representing 6.7% of the total population. This sample included 3 vice-chancellors, 200 academic staff, and 170 non-teaching staff, stratified according to the institutional locations of the three universities. The sample size was determined using the Taro Yamane formula for sample size determination, ensuring adequate representation across the selected universities.

The instrument used for data collection was a structured questionnaire divided into two sections. Section 'A' measured organizational culture, titled the Organizational Recognition and Performance Appraisal Questionnaire (ORPAQ), while Section .B. measured effective administration, titled the Effective Administration of Public Universities Questionnaire (EAPUQ). The instrument employed a four-point Likert rating scale of:

- Strongly Agree (SA)-4
- Agree (A)-3
- Disagree (D)-2
- Strongly Disagree (SD)-1

Items with a criterion mean score of 2.50 and above were accepted, whereas items below 2.50 were rejected.

To ensure validity, the draft questionnaire was submitted to three experts in the Department of Educational Management, Ignatius Ajuru University of Education, for review and validation. Their comments, corrections, and suggestions were incorporated into the final version of the instrument to guarantee that it measured what it was intended to measure. The reliability of the instrument was determined using the test-retest method. The questionnaire was administered twice to two groups of professionals from public tertiary institutions not included in the main study, with a two-week interval between administrations. The data obtained were analyzed using Cronbach's Alpha, which yielded a reliability coefficient of .750, indicating acceptable internal consistency.

The researcher personally administered the questionnaires to heads of departments and other staff members in the selected universities, assisted by two trained research aides to ensure effective distribution and retrieval. Data collected were analyzed using both descriptive and inferential statistics. Mean and standard deviation were used to answer the research questions, while the Pearson Product-Moment Correlation Coefficient (PPMCC) was used to test the null hypotheses at the .05 level of significance. All statistical analyses were conducted using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) version 28.

RESULTS

Research Question 1: What is the relationship between the organizational recognitions and effective administration of public Universities in Rivers State?

Table 1 shows the data representation and analysis for the relationship between the organizational recognitions and the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Respondents agreed in all the items in research question one that organizational recognitions is related to the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Respondents strongly agreed that salaries are paid as and when due, the school creates comfortable office for all staff, staff participate in decision-making of the school, staff with outstanding contribution to the school are rewarded and social needs of staff are always considered. This is seen in the grand mean of 3.6150 greater than 2.5 criterion mean.

Research Question 2: What is the relationship between organizational performances appraisal and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State?

Table 2 shows the data representation and analysis for the relationship between the organizational performances appraisal and the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Respondents strongly agreed in all the items in research question two that organizational performances appraisal culture is related to the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Respondents agreed that Staff are evaluated and promoted as and when due, training and re-training are undergone annually, school leaders motivate staff, Self-appraisal, reward and compensation for hard work is maintain and Staff development is encouraged in the school when necessary. This is seen in the grand mean of 3.5495 greater than 2.5 criterion mean.

Testing of Hypotheses

Ho1. There is no significant relationship between organizational recognition and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State.

Table 3 revealed the results of correlation, where correlation value $r = .935$, $p < 0.000$, indicating a significant relationship between organizational recognition and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Thus, the hypothesis one was rejected.

Ho2. There is no significant relationship between organizational performances appraisal culture and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State.

Table 4 revealed the results of correlation, where correlation value $r = -.121$, $p < 0.019$, indicating a significant relationship between organizational performances appraisal and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Thus, the hypothesis two was rejected.

DISCUSSION OF FINDINGS

Recognition and Effective Administration of Public Universities

Hypothesis one stated that “There is no significant relationship between organizational recognition and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State”, the Pearson correlation results where correlation value $r = .935$, $p < 0.000$, revealed that there is a significant

relationship between organizational recognition and the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Thus, the null hypothesis three was rejected. This finding is in line with Ololube et al. (2018) and Udoh (2004), who stated that the best and surest way to command the respect of the inferiors is not by blustering and threatening, but by holiness and love and a constant regard to their welfare and to God's will and honor. Recognition in universities is of paramount important in the effective administration of universities because once the staffs are recognized in the school their ego or esteem needs can be accomplished through delegation of duties to them by the universities leaders or administrators and by so doing, the staffs ability is not only tested but his latent skills and talents are also discovered and their participation in decision-making process in the school enable them to identify fully with the policies and decision of the school which in turn create spirit of belongings and encouraged them to work harder for the realization of school goals and objectives.

Performances Appraisal and Effective Administration of Public Universities

Hypothesis two stated that "There is no significant relationship between organizational performances appraisal and effective administration of public universities in Rivers State", the Pearson correlation results where correlation value $r = -.121$, $p < 0.019$, revealed that there is a significant relationship between organizational performances appraisal and the effective administration of public universities in Rivers State. Thus, the null hypothesis three was rejected. This finding is in sync with Grossi (2012) who puts it clear that failure to align performance standards with organizational goals and objectives leads to misunderstandings, poor morale, and lack of job satisfaction, ineffectiveness, and confusion. The basic aim of performance appraisal system is to monitor staff performance, boost staff motivation that will in turn improve company morale and is a useful tool for understanding and assessing employee skill and potentials. Also, in support of the findings, Okafor (2005) pined that for effective administration of universities in Nigeria, it is very important that school administrator makes it as a duties that every university lecturer receives a written performance appraisal annually which provides a feedback on performance and justifies personnel decision such as promotion and compensation continuity with the system, termination or warning.

CONCLUSION

The effectiveness of university administration depends significantly on the fairness and efficiency of human resource management practices, particularly organizational recognition and performance appraisal systems. Drawing on Adams' (1965) Equity Theory of Motivation, this study emphasizes that employees' perceptions of fairness in recognition and evaluation processes directly influence their motivation, commitment, and overall contribution to institutional goals. When staff members perceive that their efforts are valued and equitably rewarded, they are more likely to exhibit positive attitudes and higher productivity, which enhance administrative efficiency and organizational cohesion. Conversely, inconsistent or biased appraisal and recognition practices generate feelings of inequity, leading to dissatisfaction, low morale, and reduced administrative performance.

In the context of public universities in Rivers State, where challenges such as bureaucratic rigidity, inadequate resources, and politicization persist, the equitable implementation of recognition and appraisal systems is critical. Promoting transparent

performance evaluation, objective reward criteria, and participatory administrative practices can promote a culture of trust, fairness, and accountability. The study therefore concludes that strengthening organizational recognition and improving performance appraisal mechanisms are essential strategies for enhancing effective university administration. Aligning HR policies with the principles of fairness and meritocracy, universities in Rivers State can build a motivated workforce capable of driving excellence in teaching, research, and institutional governance.

Recommendations

Based the findings from this study, the following two recommendations are made:

- University management in Rivers State should institutionalize fair, transparent, and merit-based performance appraisal systems that recognize both academic and non-teaching staff contributions. Clear criteria, regular feedback, and participatory evaluation processes should be emphasized to ensure that all staff perceive the system as equitable and motivating.
- Public universities should develop structured recognition and reward programs that acknowledge staff achievements in teaching, research, and service delivery. Such initiatives should range from commendation letters to promotion incentives will promote a culture of appreciation, enhance employee morale, and ultimately improve administrative efficiency and institutional performance.

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
